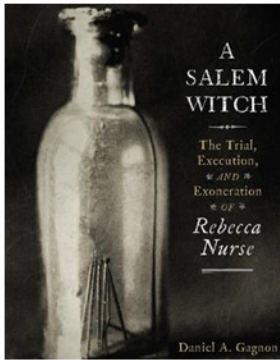

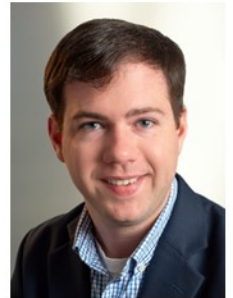
Could the Witch Hysteria have been stopped in the Parson's study? Learn the history of this exactingly restored house, and how it has survived for almost 350 years!

PHILLIS WHEATLEY, AFRICAN-AMERICAN POET

Kidnapped and enslaved in Boston during the Revolutionary Era, Wheatley was the first published African-American poet. Her work, about equality and freedom, was widely read in America and England. Recent scholarship revealed a complicated later life in Middleton, and THS VP Jeanne Pickering describes Wheatley's years there, as well as the meaning of her poetry within the social-political aspects of her time.
